What I Talk About When I Talk About Education

As a Taiwanese student, I do have lots of thoughts about education. To make it clear, I would like to take high school education for example. To get in the best universities is the only purpose for high school students in Taiwan. In order to do that, they have to do well on the final exam, which means their lives are full of classes and exams. Most of them are still unsure what to major in when choosing, so they usually choose a major according to their grades, not their abilities and interests. To me, education is a tool to find out who you really are and to strengthen what you're capable of, which education in Taiwan obviously isn't doing.

Is Taiwan the only country that mistakes the meaning of education? I don't think so. Take South Korea, which is quite close to Taiwan, as another example. High school life in Korea is pretty similar to that in Taiwan, but in my opinion, it's far worse. You can hardly find a student in Korea that doesn't go to a cram school. After school, they have to crush into the cram school to take classes. You're fortunate if you can finish them at 10 p.m., since quite a number of students have to stay until 12 a.m., or even 2 a.m. This extogenous situation results in the serious health problems of those students, and even worse, the chaos in schools. Students don't listen to the teacher in class, they are sleeping so that they can concentrate at night. They go to school because of the law. Why are they doing this? Because the competition of getting in the best universities in Korea is extremely strong.

I believe that we all know it's not necessary for everyone to get in a college. Let's take the U.S. for example. It costs a huge fortune to study in an university in the U.S., so high school students are very sure whether they need to keep studying. But is this the success of education? Does it benefits all students, or just the rich ones?

I've heard about the education in the U.K., which made me really appreciate. Not like Asian countries and even not like the U.S., to help students find out what they like, there are majors in high schools. You can really pick up classes that you're interested in, and the most importantly, those classes are delicate, not usual. If you get interest in finance, you should take classes about how to observe the changes of stock markets, how to analyze those tricky numbers, and how to

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appreciate these information. Through all of these, students get to know more about the major so that they can be sure about what to choose in the future, or be sure that it doesn't fit him or her. They concentrate and learn a lot this way because they themselves chose the classes.
